Output 2.1	Activity 2.1.2: Provisioning and upgrading of health facilities to achieve climate resilience. Technical solutions include the provision of UV sterilising equipment, improved rain guttering, PE water storage tanks, and membrane filters (plus consumables) to ensure resilient water supplies in cases of tropical cyclones and other extreme weather events. Because gastroenteritis and other water-borne illnesses occur regularly in the Cook Islands – and are exacerbated by droughts (which increase reliance on untreated boreholes, wells, and other fall-back water sources) and extreme rain events (which can overwhelm storm drains and bring sewerage runoff in contact with freshwater sources) – this solution is intended to address both acute (DRR/DRM) and chronic climate-related water security issues. Output 3.2	Activity 3.2.1: innovative communications tools (including Cook Islands Māori-language programming) to communicate risk reduction options relevant to CSHRs (including heat-related illness, mental health awareness, and respiratory disease prophylaxis), and disseminate/share these knowledge products and evidence-based practices through visual media, school resources, SRIC materials, etc. These communications tools will be selected following the communications strategy scoping exercise in Activity 1.1.4.
